

Congenital Heart Disease Resource Services.

Congenital heart disease (CHD) is the most common type of birth defect. There are many different types of CHD; some affect the heart while others affect the valves or blood vessels. Each year, about 40,000 children in the U.S. are born with CHD. These children may need multiple surgeries and a lifetime of medications to keep their hearts working.*

Your health plan offers Congenital Heart Disease Resource Services (CHDRS), at no additional cost to you as part of your benefit plan. This gives you access to leading treatment providers through the CHD Centers of Excellence (COE) network. Receiving services through these providers means you get care based on best practices from professionals with extensive expertise in treating CHD.

Specialized support.

In addition to COE network access, eligible members are paired with a CHD nurse case manager. They can help you understand your benefits and help make sure you get the care you need. Throughout the process, they'll work with you and your family, your doctors and your treatment facility.

Choosing a CHD Centers of Excellence provider.

CHDRS created strict standards for complex medical care providers. Selected programs are reviewed and chosen based on the following criteria:

- Total number of CHD procedures (including highly complex procedures).
- Clinical outcomes (such as discharge mortality and morbidity).
- Surgeon qualifications (must have at least five years' experience and meet annual case volume requirements).

Coverage for CHD services is based on your health plan's eligibility requirements and coverage guidelines. For more information, please refer to your benefit document.
